Parker, Epperly Elected at 2024 Annual Convention

Earlier this month, the West Virginia Building and Construction Trades Council (WVBCT) held their annual convention at the Waterfront Hotel and Conference Center in Morgantown, West Virginia.

More than 70 representatives from all WVBCT-affiliated craft organizations attended the event to conduct annual business, network, and hear from various speakers on industry issues.

In addition to the normal business of the convention, an election was held for the two elected leadership positions at the head of the trades on the state level.

Nominations were held for the role of President and Secretary-Treasurer and Chuck Parker and John Epperly were unanimously reelected to those positions, respectively.

The two will serve a four-year term in their positions, with the next election to be held in 2028.

"I truly appreciate all of our folks who put their faith in me," said Parker. "I'm proud of what we have accomplished over the past four years, and I look forward to continuing that work for our members during the next four."

Secretary-Treasurer Epperly also expressed gratitude to the members

that reelected him.

Appalachian Regional Clean Hydrogen Hub (ARCH2) Opens Office in Morgantown, WV

On August 21, a ribbon-cutting was held for the headquarters of the Appalachian Regional Clean Hydrogen Hub (ARCH2) at the West Virginia University Innovation Corp. office park in Morgantown, West Virginia.

The event marked a major milestone for the creation of a hydrogen hub and industry in the greater Appalachian region, sparked by the passage of the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) and the Inflation Reduction Act (IRA), spearheaded by US Senator Joe Manchin.

The ARCH2 organization is a public-private consortium that was awarded up to \$925 million from the federal government for projects in West Virginia, Ohio and Pennsylvania.

The opening of the hydrogen hub office in Morgantown comes a month after the Department of Energy announced an initial round of \$30 million would go to planning the hub during Phase 1 of the hub timeline.


The presentation was held as part of an apprenticeship training facility site tour given to officials at the Millwrights Training Facility in Parkersburg, West Virginia.

Manchin had been instrumental in steering federal dollars to his home state for the hydrogen hub through the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) and developer tax credits through the Inflation Reduction Act.

The BIL gave the Department of Energy \$7 billion to create hubs around the country that would produce and consume hydrogen, a key industrial product that is also on a shortlist of potential clean energy sources.

"It's a transition we're going into. We need horsepower," said Manchin. "One of the hubs had to be in Appalachia. It was just common knowledge. If you've got the amount of energy that we have available to us, why not be able to produce the energy?"

ARCH2 will produce what is known as 'blue hydrogen.' This is a method by which hydrogen is extracted from natural gas, and the CO2 pollution created in the process is captured and buried in deep underground wells.

The hub currently includes nearly a dozen projects that will produce, store and use hydrogen.
